Prevention Strategy: Mystery Motivator (pg. 22)


Mystery Motivator Strategy


- Based on the principle of positive reinforcement students have the opportunity to earn a reward for meeting a behavioral goal
- Components:
 - State and define the behavior that you are expecting
 - Structure the "mystery" incentive with goal
 - Hype it up!
- Classrooms in study (2014) showed immediate and significant reductions in disruptive behavior




How It Works

- Select when to run it (e.g., specific subject, time of day)
- Define target and replacement behaviors
- Set a goal (can make it a mystery too!)
- Establish a mystery motivator system









Example

- Baseline: Averaging 50 responses in the chat box per activity or question
- Goal: Increase the average number of responses in the chat box for each activity to 75 responses
- Mystery Motivator: ?
